<b>Student Achievement</b>			
<p><b>A.</b> The program used a 2022 survey of alumni who graduated 2-5 years ago (Academic Years 2017-2020) to find out whether the program adequately prepared them in core competencies for professional practice. 13 of 104 responded to the survey (12.5 % response rate).</p> <p><i>Respondents rated their agreement with the statement "The program adequately prepared me to...":</i></p>

<p><b>B. Internship:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>76.9% of the students that participated in a paid or unpaid internship were satisfied with it. 25% have not participated in internships.</li> </ul>			
<p><b>C. Other measures to define student achievement</b> (graduating class of 2022 exit survey)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>84.61 % of the students who responded are satisfied with how well the program prepared them for their current employment or activities. 38.46 % of respondents are satisfied with the continuing professional education efforts of the program and 46.15 % are neutral.</li> </ul>			
<p><b>D. Graduate Satisfaction</b> (graduating class of 2022 exit survey)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>100% of students reported that they were satisfied or very satisfied and 0% of students reported that they felt neutral about their overall experience in the BSCR program.</li> </ul>

### E. Portfolio Assessments

- Seniors must complete a final portfolio as a requirement of graduation (CRPLAN 4950, *Professional Planning Skills Development*). The Undergraduate Committee assesses these portfolios using a three-level scale of Excellent, Acceptable, and Needs Improvement. Minimum criteria: 85 % of graduating seniors earning acceptable or above on their senior portfolio. Criteria for excellence: 30 % of graduating seniors earning excellent upon second review. These results are benchmarked and monitored.

### F. Studio Skill Assessments

- The expectation is that the studio courses will allow juniors and seniors to demonstrate mastery of the core competencies. To that end, 3 instructors for AU 2022 (CRPLAN 4910S) were asked to rate their students' performance on the core competencies. We evaluate these measures every three years.
